
Land Acknowledgment

A MESSAGE FROM THE

Board Chair AND President & CEO

Ask anyone local where the hospital is, and they will tell you it's on the hill. Headwaters Health Care Centre has served the local community and surrounding neighbours for more than 110 years.

It first began as an area hospital by a group of 53 women in Orangeville who recognized the need for a hospital close to home. Fast forward to the present day, and we've celebrated our silver anniversary on the Rolling Hills site.

Our history and our future are proudly rooted in our local identity. Local pride in your local hospital means quality patient-centred care, together with our community partners. Through the years, as we've seen change in our community, we are actively making plans to grow with our community and adapt to changing needs.

Our new Clinical Priority Plan for 2023 – 2028 is the roadmap to identify where we need to grow and how we want to continue improving patient care. To develop the Clinical Priority Plan and identify what's needed the most, we heard from more than 1,000 individuals in the hospital and in our community and conducted a thorough review of our programs, service performance and projected population growth. Dufferin County-Caledon's regional population is set to grow faster

than the provincial average!
We will ensure our hospital is
constantly ready to be the pillar of
acute care close to home.

Thank you to everyone who provided input in the Clinical Priority Plan. We will seek community input once again this year, as we develop the next Strategic Plan for our hospital.

Many will say that it's not only about where you work, it's who you work with. There could not be a truer saying as we welcome new members to our Executive Leadership Team, including Annette Jones, Vice President of Patient Experience, Health Integration, Chief Nursing and Health Disciplines Executive; Dr. Grace Wang, Chief of Staff and Vice President, Medical Affairs; and Frances Duiker, Vice President of People and Culture, who joined Cathy van Leipsig, Vice President of Corporate Services & Chief Financial Officer. This year, we've developed a People Strategy Plan that prioritizes projects that impact our people; our staff. While we have seen many recent changes in health human resources, which are common across the province and industry, we are focused on retention, recruitment and recognition of talented individuals who call Headwaters their work family. We also work closely with Hills of Headwaters Collaborative Ontario Health Team, community partners and municipal stakeholders to reach shared goals to recruit and retain physicians.

Last year we began our hospital-wide Accreditation process, which was paused during the pandemic. The first part of our Accreditation was a virtual survey in September 2022 and our teams performed very well. Our in-person accreditation will take place in October 2023 – we look forward to demonstrating our commitment to

quality and safety. In the meantime, our Laboratory and Pharmacy teams each successfully completed a four-year Accreditation certification.

Through the investment in new technologies, we are committed to driving higher levels of quality across our teams and ensuring patient, staff, and caregiver safety. In Spring 2023, we were certified by Cancer Care Ontario as a Breast Assessment Site, offering the community screening and diagnostic breast imaging services including mammography-guided biopsies.

As one of the first hospitals in Ontario, we also implemented BD Pyxis Med Stations, our newest automatic medication dispensing units. Having received a commitment from the Ministry of Health for operating funds for an MRI, we are planning to offer this service soon.

We are proud to lead Headwaters, with so many talented and committed individuals. Thank you for all your contributions. We look forward to working with you in the future. \bigcirc

Spring 2022

In addition, patients can have direct access to their hospital medical information through a new patient portal, my health care, in partnership with Collingwood General and Marine Hospital, Georgian Bay General Hospital, and Royal Victoria Regional Health Centre.

Fall 2022



Headwaters seeks input from community members and partners to plan the hospital's clinical programs and services for the next five years, which will result in a new Clinical Priority Plan.



After much anticipation and a two-year COVID-19 hiatus, Pulse Café reopens. Managed by the Headwaters Health Care Auxiliary, the volunteer-led café is located in the Joan & Paul Waechter Welcome Centre, and originally part of the hospital's pre-pandemic renovations.



To help keep our community safe from the risks of the pandemic, the provincial GO-VAXX Bus begins one of many regular stops at Headwaters, offering drop-in COVID-19 vaccinations.

Winter 2022 - 2023



Headwaters receives \$1.86 million from the Ontario government to support critical hospital upgrades and repairs.



Headwaters will receive over \$800,000 in operating funding from the Ontario government for its first Magnetic Resonance Imaging Machine (MRI). The MRI will be purchased through capital funds raised by Headwaters Health Care Foundation and Headwaters Health Care Auxiliary.



The Physician Recruitment Task
Force is launched by Hills of
Headwaters Collaborative Ontario
Health Team, of which Headwaters
is a partner, to address primary
care physician shortage in Dufferin
County and Town of Caledon.

Spring 2023

Headwaters Health Care Centre is now certified as an Ontario Breast Assessment Centre by Cancer Care Ontario. Patients in the Dufferin County-Caledon area no longer need to travel far for breast evaluations, as Headwaters can provide care, closer to home.

RECOVERY
FOR A
fractured
hip

It's happened to all of us: a middle-of-the-night trip to the bathroom with a sleepy walk back to bed. Most of the time, this is no major event. For Harold, this familiar trip resulted in a fall on his right side, landing between the bathtub and vanity sink.

Early in the morning, Harold's daughter and son-in-law and grandson, whom he lives with, found him lying on the floor and immediately called 911.

When Harold arrived at
Headwaters, the emergency
doctors ran different tests, and
diagnosed him with a broken
hip. Hip fractures among older
adults like Harold can be serious
due to heightened risks with age
during surgery and post-surgical
recovery, and the initial injury
could also lead to complications.
For this reason, Harold was given
a same-day transfer to Brampton

Civic Hospital, William Osler
Health Systems for hip surgery.
"The last time I was in the hospital
was when I was 5 years old getting
my tonsils out. For 80 years, I had
never broken a bone," says Harold.
His surgery appointment was
one week after he was admitted.
"I understood that other people
in dire circumstances needed
the operating room more than I
did. My pain was bearable," he
sympathetically recalls of the wait
time.

As soon as his post-surgery assessment was clear, Harold was transferred back to Headwaters.

Admitted once again, Harold took part in a rehabilitation and physiotherapy recovery program, which he quickly took to, as an active adult who exercised regularly. "The most difficult part was learning to walk with a walker. My mobility gradually improved until I got stronger and was discharged. At home, I got used to the walker and I could take normal strides again," says Harold.

Whenever patients are admitted at Headwaters, an interprofessional health team of primary and community-care allied health practitioners meet twice daily to

discuss patient needs, and form a plan based on the consensus of expert opinions at the table, which also takes discharge into consideration.

Harold's interprofessional team recognized his readiness for discharge and made plans for his recovery at home, including wrap-around supports from specialty practitioners to visit Harold, based on his needs.

Discharge planning in partnership with Home and Community Care helps to ensure his home environment is safe and accommodating to his new health realities. "Through Home and Community Care, Julia Harding, an occupational therapist came to my home and recommended a bath chair and a pole from floor to ceiling that I could support myself, allowing me to step right into the bath chair from my walker," Harold explains.

The incredible partnership with the hospital, community care organizations and their home care practitioners make the road to recovery a smooth and continuous one, wherever the patient is receiving care.

A little over a month after the fall, Harold's daughter brought him back to Brampton Civic Hospital for a surgical check-up. "The surgeon assessed x-rays and said everything was fine. He also suggested that I wean myself off the walker, and eventually use it less and less so I can learn to walk on my own. I'm looking forward to walking outside again."

during an emergency C-section





Just as every child is unique in their family, every birth is different. When Kathryn arrived at the Obstetrics department at Headwaters Health Care Centre to deliver her third child, she knew what to expect, already having two healthy children born at Headwaters six and twelve years ago, respectively.

Things were progressing according to Kathryn's birth plan, and she chose an epidural. But when Dr. Umeh, a trusted obstetrician who had delivered one of her girls, arrived as scheduled to break her water, Kathryn knew there was something terribly wrong when she saw the tremendous rush of fluid.

Immediately assessing the situation as a cord prolapse, Dr. Umeh told her they needed to go to the Operating Room (OR) right away. With nurse Kaitlyn holding the cord, which was still pulsating with life, and nurses Nancy and Lindsey by her side reassuring her all the

way, the emotional journey up to the OR was quickly arranged. During the short wait outside of the OR, Kathryn was worried about losing her baby's heartbeat. However, the nurses found it, and then it was time for the emergency C-section.

Blue sheets went up in a hurry.
The obstetrics and OR team
members moving deftly at work
by her side, in fast-paced lock
step. Dr. Umeh lightly pinching
Kathryn's belly to test if she could
feel the pressure.

"Everything was happening so fast. I could feel what was

happening, and I was scared. But we had to get the baby out," recalls Kathryn.

"I kept looking at Dr.
Umeh, and he reassured
me. The nurses were
all calm, so I wasn't
panicking. I didn't need
to worry. Everything
was going to be OK —
I just knew it."

The anesthesiologist arrived, giving her gas and when she woke up, Makenna was born, her heart beat strong and

steady. Makenna was brought to mom right away for skin-on-skin contact, a well-researched action that benefits the baby and parent in several ways.

After the delivery, Dr. Umeh returned to Kathryn often to check up on her health. "I was so hopeful because this was a traumatic birth. Dr. Umeh was so kind."

Looking back, Kathryn describes the emergency C-section as stressful and scary to both her and husband, who never before heard of a cord prolapse and its rare occurrence.

A cord prolapse is when the umbilical cord slips out before the baby descends into the birth canal. The risk is that the pressure on the cord from the baby's weight in utero could restrict blood supply to the baby.

"I made the right choice to give birth at Headwaters," says Kathryn, expressive with thanks to the team who stayed by her side the whole time.

"I was never left wondering if everything would be alright. They were right there to reassure me. The focus was all on me, and that's how I should feel as a patient and a new mom. This is my health team; they did a great job."

THE COMPASSIONATE DIFFERENCE

of a community hospital

As told by Heath, Annette's son

Would you expect a more caring patient experience at a community hospital? That's what crossed Heath's mind, one of Annette's primary caregivers and sons, when he learned his 80-year-old mother was quickly deteriorating. Annette was visiting her other son who resides in Orangeville but plans suddenly changed when she needed emergency care.

After arriving to Headwaters
Health Care Centre's Emergency
Department, and being admitted
under Dr. Nadarajah's care,
Annette received a CT scan that
confirmed she had suffered a stroke.
"I explained treatment options and
recommended rehabilitation," says
Dr. Nadarajah.

"Right from the get-go, I could sense the difference," says Heath, recalling the intimate environment of Headwaters and the kind staff. "The decision to admit was within hours, which is a reasonable time. I was not accustomed to the

expediency I experienced." When Annette settled into her room, Heath inquired if he could bring his St. John Ambulance therapy dog, Charley, who gave Annette a tremendous level of comfort from the beloved golden doodle. "Allowing Charley to visit showed Headwaters staff's flexibility and compassion for my Mom's wellbeing," says Heath.

A few days later, a physical exam showed that Annette's condition worsened: her left side was paralyzed, she lost her vision on left side, and she was feeling weak. It wasn't too long until she moved units to work with Taylor, her Personal Support Worker. However, her health was declining, and Annette started to lose her faculties.

Annette was transferred to palliative care, where Warren and Annette were the nurses who took care of Heath's mother from that point on. Heath was appreciative that palliative care was within the same ward, as opposed to being transferred to an offsite facility. Warren and Annette also provided compassionate care during this difficult time.

"Warren made a private room available, and this gave my family more space and flexibility to spend time with her," says Heath. "At one point, I also asked Annette, the compassionate nurse who shares the same name as my mother, to tell me the truth of my mother's state. She was clear and honest and gave me a message that was hard to deliver. She gently informed us to let loved ones know they should visit her in her final days."

On December 28th at 5:36 a.m., Annette passed away, her hand held by her son.

"It was phenomenal to be there for her passage into the afterlife. I can't express my gratitude enough to the staff who helped our family through this time. We did not feel rushed, we felt cared for. We were able to say goodbye in a very loving and compassionate manner."

"Headwaters was exceptional and unlike anything I have seen at any of the other hospitals I have visited throughout the GTA during my adult life," says Heath.

"Every staff I came in contact with did a terrific job and their efforts are so appreciated. They all fall under the definition of what a real hero is."



LIFE-SAVING TREATMENT

close to home

So, when Liz learned that her kidneys had been failing, she was immensely relieved to learn that her dialysis treatment that had begun in Brampton could be done in her hometown of Orangeville at Headwaters Health Care Centre. Three dialysis treatments, every week, became the norm for Liz, in order to keep her healthy.

"I'm really lucky to have found dialysis care close to home. It means the world to me," says Liz. "Kidney transfer workups involve a lot of testing, which were mostly arranged through Headwaters' dialysis department. Tania Alexander, Interim Manager, Ambulatory Care, coordinated

with the University Health Network kidney transplant program and I received outpatient nephrology care at Headwaters. The nephrologist monitored my health very closely during and in between each dialysis session. I received excellent care from a really caring team of staff."

Her original plan after the first year of dialysis in 2017 was to secure a transplant donor. Then the news hit: cancer in her right kidney. Dialysis continued and surgery was scheduled to remove her right kidney. Her transplant would have to wait after surgical recovery, a wait that was extended by COVID-19 when day surgery,

elective appointments were paused. She also learned that her original donor was no longer qualified, and had to re-start her transfer workup plan from scratch. Liz also developed lupus after her kidney cancer, which made her extremely fatigued. Liz felt discouraged by the additional complications that were compounded by the pandemic.

"The dialysis nurses and personal support workers always made sure I was as comfortable as possible. It was nice to know I had somewhere to go, and my chair was always there, ready and waiting for me. It was hard for me to get motivated to go to my dialysis appointment because you sit there for three hours

or longer – it's hard to plan your life around the sessions but it's life-saving treatment. Seeing the smiling faces of the friendly and helpful staff made going in a bit easier. They never shared anything but kindness," says Liz.

Finally in 2022, the good news came that a kidney transplant was ready. Her kidney donor, Karen, is a high school acquaintance who became a friend when they worked together. "When I told her my donor didn't qualify, she immediately agreed to be my kidney donor. She is very caring, generous and supportive. Her decision to donate never wavered and she endured a lot during surgery and recovery. I am forever grateful and blessed to have such a wonderful friend in my life."

The Headwaters team ensured all her health details were accurately and smoothly transferred to a hospital in Toronto where she would receive the new transplant.

"Headwaters took care of me. They gave me life-saving treatment for five and a half years, and made all the arrangements that led to my kidney transplant, which gives me a new life." •

What brought you to Headwaters?

- Dr. Akula: Nearly 15 years ago, I came from India to Thunder Bay to Orangeville as an International Medical Graduate. Once I came to the community tour under the physician recruitment initiative at the time, I've never looked back. - The midwives: There were midwives in Guelph, Georgetown and Alliston many families were travelling and delivering outside of Orangeville. To help fill the gap, we were travelling back and forth between hospitals and community health practitioners for at least a year before we opened a practice locally in 2009.

Why do you love your job?

- Dr. Akula: It's not just about medicine. My gift is getting to know my patients as individuals and care for them as a whole person.
- Dr. Kahn: I love emergency medicine; the acuity and variety and its procedures. Specifically at Headwaters, I love the collegial community here and the good relationships with colleagues, nurses, and allied health consultants. Having worked at larger hospitals, it's rare that you get to know people, and that's why I love coming to Headwaters.
- Dr. McKinnon: Headwaters has a wonderful collegial atmosphere. I'm able to work at the top of my practice and do the best for my patients, alongside a great group of health care professionals.
- **Dr. Woolnough:** It's a true pleasure to help children and their families. My job is great because of my team of six pediatricians, nurses, and clinic office manager – we all work together to deliver the best care possible. All our pediatricians have their areas of expertise which means patients don't have to travel far to access specialty care.
- The midwives: There are a lot of reasons, but the short answer is this is who we are. We also love meeting patients and their families, who come from all walks of life.

Financials


As part of our commitment to making every dollar count for our patients and community, the following information summarizes Headwaters' financial results for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2023.

The hospital was in a surplus position of \$1.4M for the year ended March 31, 2023, before negotiated compensation adjustments for the Provincial Bill 124 and pay equity were applied. As a result, a compensation liability of over \$2.4M was accrued to address this pressure, and the hospital reports an overall deficit of \$1M.

Revenue \$97.2 million


Revenues increased by \$1.76M or 1.8 % from the previous fiscal year, which relates primarily to increases in base funding, new one-time investment, Oncology drug rebates and additional surgical funding due to increased surgical volumes.

Expenses \$98.2 million


Total expenses increased by \$4.41M or 4.5% due to higher than usual inflation, impact of the Provincial Bill 124 and a large pay equity award, as well as increased costs associated to returning to pre-pandemic operational and patient volume levels.


